Many families who have recently been forced to try school at home are thinking about switching permanently to the homeschool option. Thankfully, California is a great state for homeschooling and provides several options for families to choose from.

In California, children who turn six by September 1 must be enrolled in a legal school. There are three primary options available to parents who want to homeschool.

- File a Private School Affidavit (PSA), effectively creating your own private school.
- Enroll in a Private Satellite Program (PSP).
- Enroll in a public ISP or Charter school with either a virtual or homeschool option.

How To Handle Homeschooling Your Plan To


Due to the current pandemic going on, it seems like most schools have decided to close for an indeterminate amount of time. Teachers have sent packets of work home, and most parents are still trying to figure out how to work from home, and teach their children too.

We are a homeschooling family; I work from home and my son, nieces and nephew are homeschooled, so not much has changed for us. However, I can't even imagine how challenging life must be for a lot of families right now. Below are a few suggestions on how to deal with everything going on.



Breathe

First off all, breathe. Your kids can sense your trepidation and fear, not just about the school situation but about



everything going on right now. These are scary, unsure times, but keep in mind that are so many families dealing with this same predicament, You are not alone.

Let Your Kids Breathe Too

Your kids need to breathe, too. Give them a couple days of rest from that packet of work to reflect and talk about what's going on and their feelings. They are stressed and scared, too. You can't expect them to handle things like adults and deal with it, because let's face it – none of us are dealing well with circumstances right now.

If your younger kids are having a hard time understanding what is going on right now, make sure to read my article on "How To Talk To Your Kids About Coronavirus." That'll definitely give them some insight as to what to expect in an easier to comprehend manner.



If you have older kids such as teens, let them write about their thoughts on such topics as supply-and-demand, the virus, healthcare, politics, etc – and watch a few news reports with them. Make sure to have open conversations with them as it is very important.

However, if you have younger children I suggest avoiding letting them watch the news as much as possible as it can cause them to be anxious and stressed.

School Packets

While you want your children to work on their school packet, it is important for your to pace it,

paying close attention to timelines so you don't miss them. It is not designed to be completed in a rush, however don't let



them slack too much especially if their grade depends on it.

If your kids have an assignment that is project based, let them have the freedom to do the project on their own. Provide the resources and guidance, and let them succeed or fail based on how much they put into completing the assignment.

Full time homeschoolers don't just do packets. In fact, sitting down at a table doing school work is hardly what we do. I homeschool because of the freedom I have to educate my son, but also because of life experiences. After all, academics is only a small part of what makes a person intelligent. The things we experience around us, and our responses to them, shape and mold us.

If your kids need you to sit by them to do spelling words or math problems, know that they need a little extra assurance. Take it easy on them, you're both navigating new territories.

Creating A Schedule

While it's good for sanity's sake to have and keep a homeschool schedule right now, keep in mind that these are unchartered waters in which we're treading, so please do not feel bad if you don't have a set schedule.

Your kids don't have to get up at the hour they were getting up when they had school in the morning and it's probably best if they don't. If you want to make a schedule, then do so but don't feel like you need to try to simulate a typical public school day. Talk with your children about what your expectations, and make sure to have a "we're all in this together" attitude. Include them in setting a schedule.



If you decide not to schedule, good for you too. Remember that there is no requirement, it is your home and your choice to run it how you see fit.

It's your job to keep the household running; it's their job to keep their school work going. If you are find now working from home, then you may find yourself sharing a space with your kids. It's good for them to see you doing your "home work," too.

Having Trouble Teaching Your Kids?

By now I'm sure some parents are looking at their kids homework assignments and have furrowed permanent scratch marks of confusion in their own scalps, as they try to decipher the "new math" compared to what they learned and how they learned it.

Take heart, parents. There are many resources online to teach you this math and other subjects so you can at least grasp what is going on. Don't underestimate your child's teacher, though—he or she, most likely, will be very willing to help explain or provide resources to help you.




homeschool June 2017 and I have 3 more to go.




Why I Don't Regret Being Homeschooled



I'm an autistic 19-year-old junior in college named Rebecca Giles. I was homeschooled, and I feel that this allowed me to achieve far more than I could have in an institutional school environment, because homeschooling is more adaptable to each student's individual needs, strengths, and interests. Homeschooling was uniquely right for me as an autistic student, equipping me for success by giving me an appropriate learning environment, allowing me to learn in the ways I learned best, letting me progress at my own pace, and most importantly, freeing me to explore my interests in depth.

Homeschooling gave me a learning environment appropriate for me.

In school, I would have been made to sit still for hours and hours. Nobody should have to do this, especially not autistic students who need to move and fidget



Homeschooling freed me to learn in ways that worked for me.

Like many autistic people, I have auditory processing difficulties and

struggle to learn anything by hearing. It is hard for me to process voices when there are background noises, such as the faint buzzing of electrical



equipment. I cannot follow a list of verbal instructions. However, I am a voracious reader. With homeschooling, I learned by reading; kids in school must learn primarily by listening, even if that's not how they learn best.

Homeschooling freed me to progress at the pace right for me.

A common autistic characteristic is uneven skill development. All people are better at some things than others, but for autistic students the differences can be more extreme. I'm glad I was homeschooled because that meant I wasn't pressured to progress at the same rate in all subjects. I was free to be a 14-year-old who did fifth-grade level math and twelfth-grade level language arts.

Homeschooling freed me to have an interest-based education.

Because intense, highly focused, unique interests are a common trait of autism, I believe that an interest-based education is essential for autistic students. Homeschooling gave me the freedom to focus on learning what I considered most important for me: art. This was an incredible gift. Because homeschooling allowed me far more time to focus on my interests than I could have if I had attended a typical school, my artwork could develop much faster. The extra time spent on painting paid off; at age 16, I won a full-tuition merit scholarship to the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts.



If your autistic student is not interested in a lesson that you consider essential, try finding more ways to connect it to her special interest. Connecting all subjects to art gave me a love of learning. I wrote essays about art and art history for my composition courses. For science, I independently did internet research on the physics of light and biological light perception because my artwork focuses on light and its relationship to color. We made history memorable with art projects, such as illustrating a poster on the Incan civilization or sculpting a pharaoh's head. Math was very challenging for me, but the plentiful brightly colored illustrations in my math textbook enabled me to endure it.

Institutional school systems are not designed for those with autism or those who do not fit the conventional mold of what a student "should" be. These beautifully atypical individuals often see their voices and gifts stifled and crushed by the school system's inflexibility. When given the right environment, however, a student's autism can become much more of a blessing than a disability. Autistic traits such as exceptional memory, intense interests, strong focus, great attention to detail, and a one-of-a-kind worldview can all be assets for your student-especially when she's given a learning environment that works with her, focusing on building up her unique strengths rather than fighting with her weaknesses. Homeschooling, because it is so flexible and easily individualized, can empower your autistic child to use her strengths to succeed.



Homeschool Curriculum Suggestions By Subject For New Homeschoolers

* Secular suggestionsfor Grades K-6

* I chose these selections for ease of use, because they generally follow grade level standards, and for a more"school at home" frame of mind for those wanting a back up plan to virtual learning thru their local school OR for those just getting starting and wanting more traditional choices.

* This is NOT a complete list! There are MANY programs and options for each subject but it can be very overwhelming to be faced with dozens of choices per subject. These suggestions are a good start with well regarded programs used by many homeschoolers.

* All or most of these should be covered by charter funds if using a charter.

These programs will appeal to a variety of kids but won't appeal to ALL kids!

BE SURE to look at samples or trial periods to get a better idea of the program!! Watch the intro videos and take notes to keep track of what you like/don't like. Don't expect to do this in a day, take a few weeks at least to browse and get a feel for the differences.

Be sure to do the placement test if there is one, many levels don't always coordinate with grades and program content varies greatly.

Be sure to let your child check samples out too, first impressions matter and they can tell you what they like/don't like. This will save you a lot of money (or charter funds) by taking the time up front to do this research!

We love this program BUT I only suggest this for short term use if you have a kid struggling and needs something engaging. It does not follow typical standards so might not cover all a"typical" grade would cover in a year but it DOES

work great for some kids who dislike math, need review, and need something engaging. If you use it from the start it covers all the math skills, however, it may leave gaps if only using for 1 year. But having a child that hates math and not progressing with a program is not productive either. This program is wonderful for some kids who hated math and didn't understand it but needed something different.

The levels DO NOT match grades, so use the placement test to determine level.

*If you are unsure of which history period to cover I'd suggest GEOGRAPHY instead. You can focus on world or US geography and find coordinating workbooks. You can add in culture studies for areas kids are more interested in by adding books, videos, museums, and field trips.

Language Arts:

Language arts covers a lot of ground with grammar, spelling, writing, reading and literature. There is no single workbook that will cover it all!

For just a year or to start I'd focus on weak areas and not try to cover it all! Trust me, they don't need ALL language arts subjects every year.









<u>Spectrum</u> and <u>Evan Moor</u> have good standards based writing, spelling, and grammar workbooks. They aren't the most exciting but will cover everything needed. But don't do them all! Just pick the areas they need help with such as reading comprehension or writing. I'd limit it to 1 or 2 LA workbooks. Look at samples online or in person

to determine which you prefer.

Literature

(For grade 3 and up. For younger grades just read a loud and enjoy)

I'd choose a few good novels and do a literature study to round out the year. You get to read a good book, discuss various issues it addresses, explore genre, and can practice writing with various assignments. (These can be read-a-louds or independently read.)



<u>All subjects:</u>

Outschool provides on ine classes in various lengths from 1 hour to 1 semester. Some are live classes with a teacher and others are pre-recorded.

* Games! There are tons of great games and apps that teach! Kids can learn as much from an app or board game as many textbooks out there so be aware if your child needs a different way to learn!

* Library! The library is your friend, use the hold system to save time and let your child choose their own books! Pick a topic (or let your child pick a topic) and let them search for books, it's a great skill to learn!

* Field Trips/Memberships-children learn by doing and the more they can experience, the better! Aquarium, zoo, museum, science center memberships are an extremely valuable homeschool investment.

Last helpful thoughts....

Join local and active homeschool facebook groups to gain insight and support. But also remember the advice can be overwhelming and you don't have to do it all! Every child learns differently so what works well for one child might not work for another, keep in mind when asking about curriculum and program suggestions.

Read over the state advocacy groups California Homeschool Network and Homeschool California for up to date laws, relevant news, and support. EDUCATE YOURSELF! Please take the time to read what others have provided for you. Most questions have been asked and answered and there is a wealth of information just waiting for you to read. Use the search functions on FB groups, read books and articles, listen to podcasts, watch youtube videos or whatever medium you learn best from. Yes, this will take a bit of time but it's an investment in your child's education, it's worth the time!

I caution anyone from doing ALL workbooks or ALL online. Generally, a mix is usually the sweet spot BUT let your child help guide you on this. Whatever you choose, younger kids cannot teach themselves, a parent will always have to support and be engaged to some degree, so don't think a workbook or an online program will teach your child for you 100%.

Be sure to find out if you can buy a home subscription to online programs the school is using if your child likes it and learns well with it. Many programs are available for home use. This is will keep your child on track if you are sure they will be returning to school.

I highly encourage new homeschoolers to listen to some of Julie Bogart's YouTube videos on learning and homeschooling. They are insightful, helpful, and practical!

Math manipulatives provide a fun and hands-on approach to teaching and learning math. Using them can make the repetition of math lessons exciting each time new concepts are explored. Plus, it comes with the bonus of learning while we play!

What are math manipulatives? A manipulative is a physical object used as a teaching and learning tool. We prefer using small objects for easy handling, but you can use whatever floats your boat. You may be surprised what you already have at home that can be used as a math manipulative, it can be as simple as adding a box of raisins to your math lesson.

Here are a few of our favorite objects that we incorporate into our math lessons and how we use them.



Cash Register & Pretend Money – Recently, our son was given a crew member hat to take home from a local diner, he was ecstatic! When we got home, he immediately put on his hat, grabbed his cash register with a fistful of pretend money, and was ready to play "Drive-Thru". Since then, playing "Drive-Thru" has become a fun way for us to incorporate math into our pretend play time. We start by sorting the money lowest to highest value, then fill the cash register. Next, we add a little handwriting practice to make a

menu with the food items and prices. Once we were set up, we gather our pretend food and it is off to the races with fun math play. We take turns running the cash register and sometimes the register is "broken", and we use good old mental math or our fingers. I love that the cash register doubles as a toy and storage for the pretend money.

Dominoes - These are my favorite math manipulative! I find them to be the most versatile and we use them daily. Our favorite way to use dominoes is to create number sentences. They are perfect to practice addition, subtraction, multiplication

and division. Dominoes also allow for independent learning. We keep them in a small bag and reach in to draw out a domino to create our math sentences on paper or a dry erase board. When we're done with the math lesson we stack them all and make a domino track and knock them all down.





Playing Cards - "Make 10". This is a two-player card game, using aces through tens in your deck of cards (remove jokers and face cards). The aces act as your ones. Shuffle your deck of cards and divide the cards evenly between the two players, each player making a stack of cards face down. Next, flip the top four cards over placing them side by side in front of you. The goal of the game is to "Make Ten" by using any combination of the four cards facing up in front of you. If you can make ten with your cards move them to the side and replace them with new cards from the top of your deck. If you cannot make ten, take one

of your original four cards in front of you and place it at the bottom of your deck, then draw a new card from the top of the deck. When you can't make any more groups of ten or run out of cards, the game is over. Whoever has the most groups of 10 at the end of the game, wins!

Stackable Wood Blocks – Write number sentences on the wood blocks with a permanent marker and stack the blocks for regular play, keeping the number sentence face down. Take turns removing the blocks and answering the number sentences out loud. If you answer the number sentence correctly, you get to keep your block. If you answer incorrectly, your opponent gets the block for themselves! If no one answers the number sentence correctly the block is placed on the top of the tower. Ooh, tricky! The player with the most wood blocks when the tower falls wins!



Other fun manipulatives we use are dice, number lines, geometric shapes, magnetic numbers, items found in nature (rocks, flowers, sticks), craft supplies and snacks! Snacks are great for subtraction games. Bowling (adding the scores), grocery shopping, reading clocks, and exploring the addresses on the homes in our neighborhood. Using hands-on, real world objects help keep math relevant, easy to understand and fun for your children.



Children between the ages of 6 and 18 must be enrolled in a public school or a specified alternative, and that is your decision to make! Kindergarten is not mandatory, but children who turn 6 by September 1st must enroll that school year (*California Education Code §48222, 48224*). Each family has unique needs and circumstances, so choosing an alternative will require considering your individual family situation and the needs of each child.

Your Options:

- Credentialed tutor A parent with an appropriate current California teacher's credential may teach his/her child under the private tutorial exemption. Parents may also hire a credentialed tutor for their child. Tutors are required to teach for a minimum of 3 hours each day, 175 days per school year, Monday through Friday, between the hours of 8:00 am and 4:00 pm. (California Education Code §48224)
- Private School There are two home-based private school options:

• Establish a Home-Based Private School by filing a Private School Affidavit (PSA) You may establish a private school in your home and enroll your child as an alternative to public school. This will give you the ultimate in control over your schedule and curriculum. If you establish a home-based private school, you will be the administrator responsible for record keeping, curriculum and all aspects of your child's education.

• Enroll in a Private School Satellite Program (PSP) PSPs (formerly known as umbrella schools) file a California private school affidavit every year as part of their legal obligation to be in compliance with California Education Code. They can enroll families who want to homeschool. Some PSPs offer classes, both site based and online, curriculum packages and/or activities for their members. Others offer guidance and record keeping, but leave the day-to-day details to the parents. Fees, guidance and requirements vary widely with each school.

Public ISP/Charter School Some public schools and charter schools offer independent study. These public programs are funded by tax dollars, so there is no fee to attend. Some offer a set curriculum you do at home or online. Others allow parents to select some materials. The curriculum will be aligned with Common Core and testing is required. If you enroll in one of these programs, you will need to keep the records required by your program and regularly meet with a credentialed teacher to turn in required paperwork. The amount of freedom you have in choosing what to study depends on the program's policies and your assigned teacher


