
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June 1, 2025

Protecting All Paths: Why California Homeschoolers Must Stay Informed About AB 84

California is home to one of the most diverse and flexible homeschool landscapes in the country. Families can choose from several legal options to educate their children, whether through private home-based education, or enrollment in independent study programs.

At CHN, we support the right of each family to choose the educational path that best fits their values, lifestyle, and children's unique needs. But in order to preserve that freedom, it's vital that we all stay informed about legislation that may affect the broader homeschooling community, even if it doesn't directly impact our chosen path.

One such bill is Assembly Bill 84 (AB 84), which is currently under discussion in the California Legislature. While the bill specifically targets independent study charter schools, the broader implications concern us all. When one legal homeschool path is threatened or restricted, it sets a precedent that can impact the others. Today it may be charter school families; tomorrow it could be private home educators. We believe that informed families are empowered families. That's why we encourage every homeschooler in California to:

- Read the bill: Take a moment to review AB 84 and understand what changes are being proposed and which communities could be affected.
- Research the ripple effects: Many homeschool families have friends or family in

 Know your representative: It's important to know who represents you in the California State Assembly and Senate. Visit findyourrep.legislature.ca.gov to look up your legislators.

 Engage respectfully: If you have questions or concerns, consider calling your legislators, writing a letter or scheduling a meeting with your representative.
 Sharing your story and explaining how homeschooling has supported your family is a powerful way to contribute to the public dialogue.

At CHN, we remain committed to protecting all legal homeschool paths in California. No matter how we homeschool, we are stronger together. Let's continue to lift one another up and remain alert, informed, and united in support of educational freedom.

STEAM Fun

- **DIY Science Days:** Make a volcano in the sandbox, build a homemade rocket, or try simple kitchen chemistry like baking soda experiments.
- **Tinker Time:** Build cardboard castles, design marble runs, or repurpose recyclables into new inventions.
- Art & Engineering Challenges: Try creating bridges with popsicle sticks or designing art from natural materials found on a hike.

Family Bonding & Field Trips

 Local Field Trips: visit museums, botanical gardens, historical landmarks, or community farms. These are great "sneaky school" moments that double as fun family outings.

- Family Game Nights or Story Circles: Play strategy board games, tell collaborative stories, or read aloud under the stars.
- **Themed Days:** Pick a theme (e.g., "Ancient Egypt" or "Outer Space") and plan a day of crafts, snacks, books, and activities to match.

The beauty of homeschooling is that life and learning are intertwined. There's no last day of discovery—just new seasons, new questions, and new memories to make. Summer is the perfect time to nurture your child's curiosity, deepen family bonds, and find joy in learning outside the lines.

This simple yet delightful craft is the perfect mix of creativity and quality time—plus, it's a gift Dad can enjoy over and over again. With just a few supplies and a little imagination, you'll craft a game that's both fun to play and easy to take anywhere.

The set in the following picture was lovingly created by my children (ages 4 and up) for our upcoming Father's Day campout. They had a blast choosing the team themes —"Starry Night" versus "Orange Tent Under a Tree"—and each took turns painting their own unique rock designs while chatting and laughing together.

So, grab some rocks, bring out the paint, and let's make memories that will last far beyond the holiday!

Materials Needed:

- 10 smooth, flat rocks (roughly the same size)
- · Acrylic paint or paint markers
- Paintbrushes (small detail brushes work best)
- Sealer or Mod Podge (to protect the paint)
- A small drawstring bag (canvas or cotton works great)
- Fabric marker or paint for the bag design
- Pencil (for sketching designs)

Step-by-Step Instructions:

- 1. Prep Your Rocks
- Wash and dry the rocks thoroughly to remove dust or dirt.
- If desired, paint a solid base color on each rock and let them dry.
- 2. Paint Your Game Pieces
- Divide the 10 rocks into two groups of five.
- On one set, paint "X" designs using a bold color.
- On the other set, paint "O" designs in a contrasting color.
- To make them extra cute, consider painting themed designs—like bees vs. ladybugs, stars vs. hearts, or cats vs. dogs!
- Let the paint dry completely before applying a sealer to protect your artwork.

- Lay out the drawstring bag and smooth it flat.
- Using a fabric marker or paint, draw a tic-tac-toe grid (3x3 squares) on one side of the bag.
- Let the paint dry completely before applying a sealer to protect your artwork.
- 4. Play & Store
- Once everything is dry, place your painted rocks inside the bag.
- When ready to play, simply use the bag as the game board!
- Store everything neatly inside for easy travel and fun on the go.
- 6. Decorate! (Optional)
- Paint the pencil shaft green to look like a stem.
- Add glitter, sequins, or draw patterns on your flower petals.
- Use markers to add detail or "veins" to your ribbon leaves.

Now you're ready for endless tic-tac-toe matches wherever you go. Enjoy!

Delayed Academics: Key to Preventing Learning Problems

As children are pushed to achieve academic goals at earlier and earlier ages, the incidence of learning disabilities is growing at an alarming (some say epidemic) rate. There may be a host of root causes, from immune response issues to dietary and familial problems, but one factor is susceptible to immediate control by parents who choose to homeschool and that is the age at which traditional academic work is introduced to their children. One hundred years ago, it was common for children to enter school at age 8 or even later. Two hundred years ago, children were not even accepted in most schools until they could read. Today, in contrast, the most arduous efforts of our public schools cannot produce high school graduates who can compare favorably in knowledge and skills with the 8th grade graduates of 1900...



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
